We celebrated our second birthday with many of our donors on the eve of the Make it Home Anniversary Sale. The Friday and Saturday weekend sale found the MIH warehouse filled with treasure hunters. Our shoppers found tchotchkes and trinkets, art, pillows, headboards and everything in between! Because of you and your generosity, our ability to help and serve communities across the Bay Area continues to grow. We are excited to be entering our third year, and celebrated the opening of our Walnut Creek Make it Home. We have big plans for the future and continue to dream big on behalf of the those beginning to dream again!

We continue to grow and develop partnerships with other non-profit agencies who share our vision for reimagining home; particularly for those who are seeking to create a space of safety, comfort, dignity and pride while recovering from trauma or crisis. We partnered with Dignity Moves on the Labath Landing Project in Rohnert Park. We helped set up tiny homes for 35 new residents with items like bedding, small area rugs, cleaning supplies and wall art.

Central to DignityMoves' vision is that everyone receives a private room with a door that locks. Many experiencing homelessness are reluctant to accept beds in shelters so ffering this sense of security helps clients feel more willing to engage in the critical supportive services. One resident shared, "When I was living in my tent, I felt like I was constantly in survival mode, worried about my safety and where I might find my next meal. Now I am warm and dry and can lock my door at night." We are so delighted to help these residents feel comfortable and safe in their spaces.









Everyone should be able to sleep in a clean, new bed and not on the floor.

Many people who finally receive housing, often return to shelters because sleeping on the floor and sitting on crates does not feel like a home, and the shelters have beds, blankets, dining rooms and common living spaces.

For nearly 75 years, Hanna Center has helped some of the most vulnerable youth create better futures for themselves. The Hanna Center has launched a new Transitional Age Housing Program designed to provide a safe and supportive environment for former foster youth, ages 18-21, who have aged-out of the traditional foster care system. Hanna Center's Transitional Age Housing Program offers individual, family and group therapy, rehabilitation, comprehensive clinical case management and medication support to youth who need support the most. Participants will also work with staff to access resources and services to assist them in obtaining and sustaining permanent housing. Make it Home and a Crew of volunteers and created 24 cozy studio apartments, study rooms, living rooms and dining rooms, complete with art and plants and brand new beds. We also set up a home for some of the young adults who are parents. We are honored to be a part of helping these young people navigate pending adulthood in their safe and stylish new spaces.



Children deserve to live in stable, loving homes; yet they often enter into the child welfare system through no fault of their own. The positive impact resource families can have on foster youth, and on society at large, is immeasurable. We are devoted partners of the Marin Foster Care Association and are honored to be a part of MFCA's plans to help neighboring counties duplicate Marin's Community Resource and Support Center for those caregivers and kids.

We worked last year with MFCA in Sonoma County to completely furnish and open Our Village Closet and this month we were so happy to fully furnish and help open The Foster Village of Contra Costa County.







These Community Centers equip foster youth and caregivers with support and resource connections, essential supplies, and materials that can help fortify a safe, consistent, and nurturing home environment for those impacted by the welfare system. They provide the needed, extra layers of support that strengthen connections and help the youth and caregivers of foster care feel seen, feel heard, and feel a sense of belonging. We love to make it easier to say, "YES!" to fostering CARE to youth in need, and helping people who are #makingithome for children.
